1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Government J.MP. College Takhatpur is affiliated to Atal Bihari Vajpaee University Bilaspur. The college was established on 15 July 1965 by "Takhatpur Sikshad Samitee" with arts and science faculty. The college was taken over by the Government of Madhya Pradesh on 1st October 1982. It is located on Bilaspur - Mungeli road & is about 31 kms from Bilaspur. The campus of the college is about 11.04 acres. The college currently offers:-

- 1. B.A., B.Sc. B.com & B.C.A. at graduation level.
- 2. Post graduation in Hindi, History, political Science, Economics & Sociology.
- 3. B.C.A., Geography in B.A. & M.A. in economics & Sociology is run by the Janbhagidari Samittee.

This is the only institute in Takhatpur block and students come from nearby villages, majority of them belonging to SC/ST/OBC categories. The college was sanctioned Rs2.13 crore for infrastructure development under RUSA in 2019. The college library has 23700books, e-books, e-journals with N-List.

The main aim of the college is to give the best education to the students. Our aim is the overall development of the students' personality. Our goal is to build leadership, promote integrity, and inculcate the spirit of service so that they excel in all spheres of life. Institutional Weakness

- 1. Insufficient fund provided by the government for ICT facility.
- 2. The majority of the students come from backward areas and being financially weak so that they are unable to use ICT facilities.
- 3. The majority of the students are from rural areas and weak in English. So, they are not able to take advantages of e-resources as the matters are available in English.

Institutional Opportunity

- 1. We educate the students in such a manner that they can seek higher education in minimum fees.
- 2. Institution gives them platform to benefit our rich e-library.
- 3. There are opportunities in the field of sports & other co-curricular activities through NCC and NSS .

Institutional Challenge

- 1. The most difficult task is to educate the students with our core values in limited resources.
- 2. Financial resources are limited to introduce new courses.
- 3. Due to lack of budget, e-lab for English language could not start. Hence, the students cannot access related material from the internet.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Government J.M.P. College Takhatpur has a clear vision of teaching, learning, research and innovation. College work as a tool for peace, progress and prosperity for all student and faculty members.

It is important to mention that the college has to teach curricula designed by the affiliating university and the institute makes efforts for curriculum improvement through its representatives who are participating in BOS (Board of Studies) meeting and provide suggestions and inputs for revision of the syllabi in the respective department of the university. College looks after the effective implementation and timely completion of prescribed syllabi in various disciplines.

The college has introduced market demanding course B.C.A. which is introduced in only few Government college of District .The colleges has post-graduation course in Economics, Sociology, Political Science and Hindi & History.

In the curriculum designed by the university there are many papers and topics related to cross cutting issues related to gender, environment and sustainability and human values at U.G. and P.G. program.

For quality improvement of our institution, college also takes feedback from students, parents, alumni, and teachers. Students have to fill feedback form about their course & teachers. These feedbacks are collected and analyzed and necessary actions are taken so that quality of institution can be empowered.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The most important thing in teaching learning process of this college is to develop skill, knowledge and generate interest among the students by the teacher. The teachers take extra class, giving books and notes for slow learners to enhance their knowledge and also motivates for e-resources.

Student centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhance learning experiences. Engaging with students to direct experience and focusing reflection is done in order to increase knowledge and develop skill. Participative learning helps to build flexibility, collaboration, critical thinking in our students. Innovation and Creativity apply in teaching learning to enrich the lives of students through development of their unique individual personality and ensure excellence in all areas. Teaching learning process is completed as per Academic calendar and regular unit test and internal test are taken by subject teacher. Students are assessed by their participation in the class.

Every teacher is appointed as a mentor of each class and they counsel the students to resolve their problem. By student satisfactions survey the college encourages students to participate in survey and give their suggestion to improve the teaching learning experiences.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The main objective of college is to focus on over all development of students and encourage mass participation in various awareness programs. A committee is placed in-charge to organize several workshops and sensitization programs.

There are two research guides in our college in political science and History. College has a research center of Political Science which enhances the quality of our research oriented students. College has a motto to make neatness and cleanliness in college campus through our staff with the help of students. District collector has been awarded to our two faculty members Dr. Rajeev Sharma and Dr. S.K. Padey as a master trainer for election.

The institution is involved in various extra-curricular activities and extension programs in order to help society by its services and make the surrounding a better place to live. The college has NCC unit involved in rendering social and community services. Students of NCC and NSS being trained through various camps. They aware and motivate to villagers by posters and rallies. They get extra benefit for selection in their jobs.

Red Cross club is activated in our college which helps to make the student's life much better and develop their leadership skill. The club organized medicine distribution program, blood donation camp, awareness program about health and facilitates primary treatment as first Aid.

The college also organizes various competitions offering a chance to participants to gain substantial experience,

Showcase skills, analyze and evaluate outcomes and improve their personal attitude.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The whole campus is spread over 11.04 acres. There are 22 classrooms (including laboratories/seminar hall and smart room) with proper seating arrangement, appropriate furniture, proper lighting and good ventilation with wide corridors. Even when they formally leave college for higher studies, they are an connected and active and vibrant Alumni association named "GOVT. The feedback is by the alumni and our institution analyzes that and makes necessary actions for the development of college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Government J.M.P. college Takhatpur is run by state government. Its organization and management is as per the instructions of CG Govt. Principal and other staff are appointed by the department of higher education (C.G.).Principal of the college decides internal politics / strategy with co-ordination of different committees .Librarian and Sport officer also do their best for the mental and physical health.

Every year, Budget allocated by the government to the college which is distributed by the principal to different departments. According purchase rule of Chhattisgarh, purchasing committees with department finalize purchasing process for necessary books, equipments and other items within provided funds. 1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The Govt. J.M.P. College, Takhatpur is affiliated to Atal Bihari Vajpayee University, Bilaspur (earlier known as Bilaspur University Bilaspur C.G.) and follows the curriculum developed by the university. College develops a number of action plans at various levels for effective implementation and delivery of the curriculum which are as under:

a) The university notification on academic curriculum and other guidelines, once received by the college office is communicated to the respective department. The department after consultations among faculty members carefully allocate papers keeping the interest of the students and expertise of teachers in mind.

b) Time Table Committee prepares the time tables taking into account the infrastructural and laboratory needs. Time table (class wise/teacher wise) approved by the committee and the Principal is displayed on college Notice Board well before commencement of the semester for easy accessibility. Room wise time table is prepared for the purpose of clarity.

c) Departmental committees determine the workload, recommend recruitments and prepare the list of necessary practical equipments requirements for effective implementation of the curriculum. Each department maintains daily diary and attandence register regularly.

d) Each department ensures that the readings (prescribed/suggested) in the respective papers are made available in the college library and curriculum related references books are regularly updated. Similarly, laboratory equipment/tools are also upgraded as per the curriculum needs.

e) The on-line printed resources provided by the department are made accessible to the students. Free Wi-Fi zone is available at science & Arts wing and State Government earlier distributed the free Tablets in year 2016-17 and Smart Mobiles in year 2018-19.

f) The department also organizes remedial classes for needy students to enable them to cope with the curriculum.

g) Our library keeps last 5 year question paper of University and provides to students.

h) In Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) meeting decisions are taken for successful implementation of curriculum through new books, inviting resource persons and providing better practical facilities.

i) To supplement the curriculum students are given practical experience too.

In BA V Semester Economics offers Development and environmental economics In MA Economics, Environmental Economics is offered as an optional paper.

Human Values :At undergraduate levels (B.A., B.Sc., B.Com., B.C.A.)- Environmental Studies and human rights is a compulsory under the constitution of India. In this paper meaning and protection of human rights under the UNO charter is covered. Student learns about human rights and fundamental rights and duties under Indian constitution. Student get knowledge about Protection of human rights act 1993-national human rights commission, state human rights commission and human rights court in India

In the first year In BA course sociology – topics of social interest and social concerns are included in the course which give them knowledge of Indian society its values, reformations of society against social evils, a social movement in tribal's'.

In BA I Geography paper is human Geography.

In BA V semester course Hindi- has essays which are a compilation of views of social reformers of India and their contribution in development of new India.

In MA Sem 1 paper IV urban society in India, sem III paper IV criminology give important knowledge of human values.

In MA sem I paper II and sem II paper II Hindi ancient poetry of Kabeer, Tulsi, Jayasi, Suur was directly concerned with social issues, Human values, cultural attributes .

In MA Sem IV paper III Hindi Theory and practical of journalism & course Paper IV related to theory and practice of Chhattisgarhi language is taught .

In MA English-Poetry and prose of literary giants deeply touches issues like human value.

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Education and its evaluation is a continuous process which helps to improve performance of the students on. Active participation of students in each class is mandatory for their overall assessment. Assessment and evaluation are an important part of the entire educational process. - For the post graduate program college conduct sessional and internal evaluation examination, class test, group discussion class level seminar and presentation for continuous internal evaluation. As per semester system applicable from 2016-17 two internal assessment of 20 marks of each semester are conducted by the college as per the guidelines of Atal Bihari Vajpaee Vishwavidyalaya, Bilaspur(C.G.)
- Each student encouraged to give class level seminar and presentation in the class to enhanced their self confidence level.
- Faculty members prepare question paper for internal evaluation examination.
- Sample questions were distributed to students and their answer were discussed which helps to students understand the content more clearly and improve their thinking and writing skill.
- Once the examination is over answer copies are evaluated by the faculty members and internal evaluation marks are uploaded in the affiliated university web portal.
- For the students of science and Geography practical sessions is also considered for continuous assessment.
- Every teacher is considered as a mentor of each class. Mentors help to clear their doubts and also guided in their personal matter.
- Observing the improvement in learning of slow learner and promoting the advanced learners by

assessing their performance in class test and internal examination.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

The institute is affiliated to ABVV. The rules and regulation process are laid down by the university. There is complete transparency in the internal assessment evaluation. Internal assessment includes test, assignment, seminars, presentation, internal exam etc. Students are also assessed by their participation in the class.

- Teachers take separate class test, unit test for the students maximum of 10 marks. Before taking test syllabus or questions communicated to students well in advance.
- Assignment, class level seminar topics and projects are offer by teachers to assess students in more innovative ways. Seminar is also a part of internal assessment for which particular topic is allotted to the students by the subject teachers and students present their seminars in front of subject teacher and class. Seminar is assessed based on presentation. Students demonstrate their communication skill.
- In project work at class level topic is distributed among the students. They prepare their project on given topic.
- According to the university provisions in science and geography subject practical examination conducted in the presence of external examiner appointed from the other colleges as decided by the university and 5 or 10 marks out of 50 marks reserved for sessional marks. Sessional marks are the part of internal evaluation that is depends on their attendance in practical, performance during practical class and preparation of records.
- Time table for internal assessment is prepared well in advance and announced by the teacher in their respective classes.
- Answers copies of class test are shown to the students in class room and discussed about questions patterns and marking patterns. If students have any doubts related to their marks then it is resolved immediately.
- Answer books of internal examination are shown on the demand of students and guided them for improvement of their performance in main University Examination.
- Subject teachers prepare question papers for class test sessional and internal examination.
- Changes in schedules of internal examination and test of any are notified to the students through notice board or announced it in classroom by subject teacher.

Students are encouraged to participate in class group discussion, seminars, model and poster presentation, quiz etc. This interaction builds confidence among the students. Internal tests are compulsory and numbers are added in the annual exams.

ICT is highly useful for teachers as well as students.Most of the teachers use ICT for teaching. The different ICT tools used by teachers are computers, internet and smart classroom. Wi-Fi facility is there for the students and teachers. The college also organizes competitive exams for the outgoing students so that they are prepared to face exams like PSC, NET, SLET, BANK and others. Eminent speakers are invited to deliver lectures whether it is subject related or for personality development of the students.

Evidence of success: -

This can be seen with the result of the student's annual exams. The students are going for further studies, facing competitive exams and getting good placement.

Competitive exams are conducted for the outgoing students to prepare them for their entrance exams in various fields. Eminent speakers are also invited to lecture on different subjects.

The college is increasing its infrastructural facilities with the changing time. Our thrust is to get recognition as one of the best college of this rural area. It is the aim of the college to embolden the talent of the student and let them emerge as responsible citizens and for this we are providing quality education to our students.
